Part 1 - (Initial post)

Answer **ONE** of the prompts listed below from the assigned readings (**200 words minimum**). Include the **prompt and word count** in your post, so I know which prompt you responded to and how well you met the required word count. (Note: The prompt question does not count towards the required word count)

Question Prompts to Consider:

- 1. What skills do you believe are most important for a global economy?
- 2. What do international career readiness skills look like in your field?
- 3. Thinking about your future, why is it important to learn about the world?
- 4. What is intercultural communication? Why is it essential in the workplace?
- 5. Education is critical for providing the skills necessary to live in society. Why is it important to learn to communicate and collaborate with people from other countries?

Part 2 - (Peer Responses)

Respond to **2 peers** (**50-75 words**), **and include the word count.** Peer responses should agree, disagree, question, and deepen the discussion. Please do not use your word count toward complementing your peers. If you want to commend what they have said, that's fine, but it should not be the primary substance of your responses.

Students should imagine writing to colleagues and professors and running spell and grammar checks. Please read over the rubric for assessment criteria.
